
Our team is geared towards learning and non-judgement. We ask questions and listen to answers, recognizing that everyone has something valuable to contribute to what we do.

In our Food Services branch, we are dedicated to not only alleviating hunger in a dignified and low-barrier way but also advancing household and community food security. We offer a range of programs designed to meet various needs within our community, including but not limited to:

**Nourish House Food Bank:** A non-traditional, shopping-style food bank where clients can choose the food they receive based on their needs and preferences.

**Mobile Food Market (MFM):** A van (and trailer in the summer months) that sets up in various food deserts around Brock Township, providing fresh, locally sourced produce, eggs, prepared meals, and other affordable food items to the community.

**Community Kitchen:** Our community kitchen is at the heart of our food services branch. All of the work our team does in the kitchen supports other Food Services programs, as well as programming run by our community partners.

**Community Lunch:** An opportunity for all members of our community to enjoy a healthy meal with their neighbours and friends without financial barriers.

Food Literacy Workshops & Camps: We offer engaging learning opportunities for all ages and abilities, covering topics such as safe food preparation, meal planning, understanding food systems, and more.

Maple Tree Community Garden (MTCG): A beautiful allotment style, community garden with an orchard and berry bushes.

In 2023, our Food Services team worked tirelessly to enhance and create multidimensional access points for those experiencing any level of food insecurity. This ranged from emergency food access to community events, all while combating negative stigmas associated with these programs to ensure that anyone in need feels comfortable seeking assistance.

We addressed a significant 2.5x increase in visits to the Nourish House food bank by extending our hours of operation to five days a week, including two evenings. This expansion would not have been possible without the invaluable support of partners who hosted food drives, fundraisers, and donated resources.









To further increase sustainability within Food Services, we introduced a laundry and dish soap refill station at Nourish House and continued our reusable bag incentives, particularly at the Mobile Food Market, which celebrated its second birthday this year. MFM also saw increased use of Market Bucks, distributing \$5,840 in fresh produce vouchers to the community. Our expanded value-added line now includes preserves, helping to divert food waste by using gleaned and donated seasonal produce from local farms.

Our Community Kitchen continued to offer Meals on Wheels through Community Care and prepared meals for seasonal agricultural workers in partnership with Brock Community Health Centre (BCHC) and the Durham Region Migrant Worker Solidarity Program. We also supported BCHC and the Brain Injury Association of Durham with holiday meals. Most notably, we reopened our kitchen doors to the public after three years by re-introducing in-person cooking classes and our Community Lunch, creating a space for the community to come together over affordable meals.

Our programming flourished this year with 52 virtual and in-person workshops on topics like food systems, proper food storage, and meal planning. We found such success with our summer camps that we plan to double the sessions we offer next year! These events, offered free of







charge or with sponsored spots, ensure accessible learning opportunities for all. We couldn't have achieved this without the generosity of partners like Farm Credit Canada and local businesses.

In 2023, our ability to provide nourishing food and supportive resources has only strengthened. With increased passion and collaboration, we can turn any challenges we face into opportunities for positive change.

Formally established in 2023, our Social Services branch goes beyond addressing immediate needs, offering programs and services to support and sustain growth for individuals, families, and the community as a whole. These programs and services include, but aren't limited to:

**Transitional Housing:** Our transitional housing program offers affordable, temporary emergency housing for up to six months to community members at risk of homelessness. It provides a safe space to plan for the future, focusing on finding permanent housing and including system navigation, warm referrals, and case management.

**Service Hub:** We partner with other agencies to increase the accessibility of services to our community. We regularly host organizations that can help with employment, income supports, tax filing, and much more.

**Life Skills Workshops:** We bring in subject matter experts to cover a variety of topics, such as financial literacy, first aid, and

babysitting, to empower community members by providing them with practical knowledge and tools to help them thrive.

In its first year as a fully established branch of TNDF, our team celebrated the official opening of Cedar Haven and added two additional units to our transitional housing program. This brought our total transitional housing units from two in 2022 to seven in 2023 and allowed us to house 31 people at risk of homelessness.

Beyond addressing immediate needs, our Social Services team has developed a service model that offers meaningful opportunities for support and growth for individuals, families, and the community.

Twenty-four attendees learned how to care for children, respond to emergencies, and promote themselves at our most popular workshop of 2023: the Babysitting Course offered in March in partnership with the Canadian Red Cross. We are proud to have partnered with more than ten organizations that share our vision of empowering individuals with the skills they need to thrive.

As a team, we have evaluated our capacity and strengthened ties with community organizations that fill service gaps identified by the lived/living


















experiences of the people we serve. In doing so, we are getting closer to creating meaningful change. We happily welcomed Eliza, our Transitional Housing Senior Coordinator, and Tierney, our Social Services Assistant, to our team, as their invaluable efforts have helped us to provide our clients with additional support in building relationships and skills and have introduced more social support to the community.

In partnership with Warm Tootsies, a yearly winter clothing exchange for children and youth in Brock Township, we were able to distribute 181 winter clothing items and purchase 43 new pairs of winter boots for kids in need. Additionally, we received a donation of 17 purses and one backpack filled with personal necessities from Fill a Purse for a Sister, a national campaign that seeks to bring comfort, hope, and dignity to women and youth in crisis.

We are proud to have played a part in influencing change at a local level, as defined by one of our core values: advocacy. We are proud of the progress our Social Services team made in meeting the needs of the at-risk community in Brock in 2023. We remain dedicated to improving our services and continuing to make a positive impact on those facing challenging situations.

# Advocacy


In 2023, we also introduced a line of eco-conscious and locally produced merchandise promoting our values, "Good Food for All" and "Housing is a Human Right".

A defining moment of the year was November 27, when our team successfully petitioned Brock Township to declare intimate partner violence an epidemic. This milestone was followed by an event featuring Heather Doughty, founder of 'INSPIRE: The Women's Portrait Project,' to observe the National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women.


